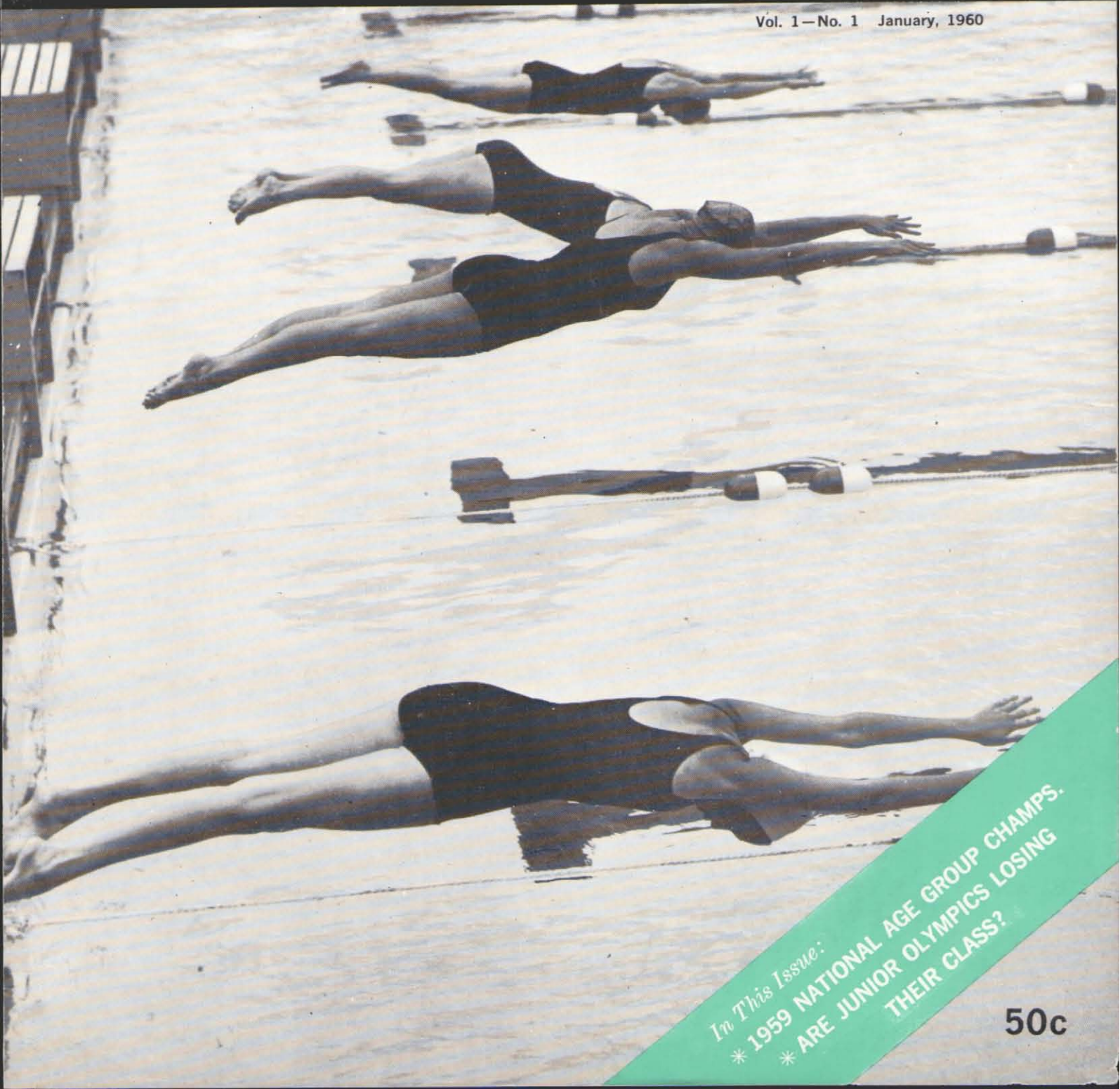

ARE JUNIOR OLYMPICS LOSING THEIR CLASS ?

In the early '50's, the Amateur Athletic Union of the United States set up a youth development program in track and field and in swimming. Designed for mass participation and sponsored by communities, public recreation depts., newspapers, schools and other organizations, this program was called the AAU Junior Olympics. Swimming and diving was separated from the AAU Committee on Age Group Swimming and was administered by a governing National AAU JR. OLYMPIC Committee. The committee set up special rules for competition and all records were compiled and recorded separately.

Sparked by the National Committee, the Junior Olympic swimming meets soon became the highlight of the age group summer season. In 1957 thirty-four districts participated; in '58 thirty-eight of the 48 district associations conducted meets and this past year the total was even greater.

NUMBER OF SWIMMERS

The number of swimmers entering age group competition has grown by leaps and bounds. Districts with fewer age group swimmers may feel that they are no problems, those with Jr. Olympic meet swimmers totaling over 650 with close to 1700 entries claim to have one. But regardless of the number of district competitors, there seems no unanimity of opinion. Sooner or later all districts, no matter how large or small, will recognize that factions within desire changes...and these dissident voices hurt the very purpose of the Junior Olympic program.

"It's a cheap meet"...I've heard that remark over and over again by both coaches, officials and yes, even the contestants. And they are not referring to monetary value. It is the only program that confines its meets to straightway 25 yard and 50 meter pools. It

has thousands of swimmers competing within the confines of a uniform course. A district first means something and a national placing should carry the same relative honor to the junior swimmer as that afforded the athlete who participates in an International Olympiad.

RULE CHANGES

Attempts to change this rule have been unsuccessfully tried at AAU National Conventions for many years. To affect a change, the new rule or amendment must be submitted to AAU Committee 60 days in advance of convention for placement on the agenda for discussion and vote. And you can bet this year will be no exception.

Proponents of the present rule feel that relaxation of the rules defeats the goal of the Jr. Olympic program. That it is needed to give a lift to those swimmers who are always under the thumb of the top performers. That it is needed to nurture the slower developer, from a morale standpoint, particularly in the lower age brackets, to keep them from dropping out of swimming. And, they claim, no other program achieves this as well as the AAU Jr. Olympics.

Opponents call it a "give-away meet." Now here is where the beefs start. NO CONTESTANT MAY ENTER OR PARTICIPATE IN MORE THAN THREE (3) SHORT COURSE EVENTS AND THREE (3) LONG COURSE EVENTS INCLUDING RELAYS.

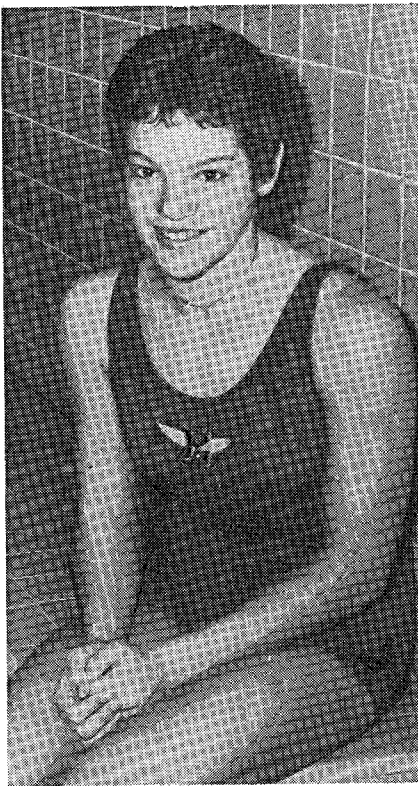
Should the better swimmers sacrifice their individual effort to strengthen the relay team, or should they swim relays and lose individual titles by default. Local individual event winners may be only sixth best by past performances and seeding, yet she or he will receive community acclaim as the Jr.

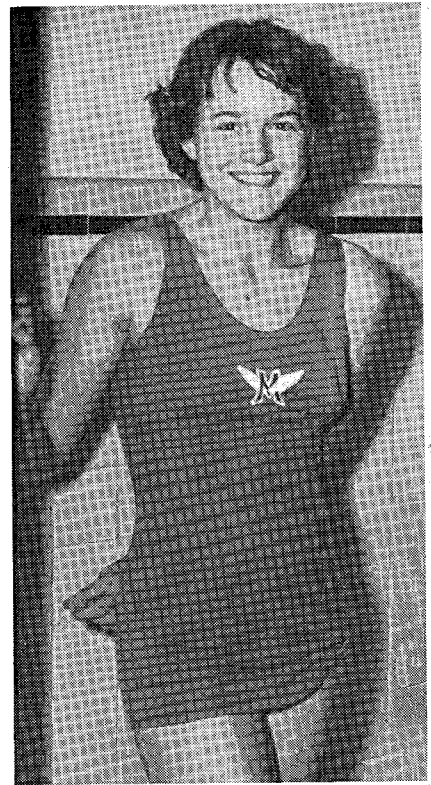


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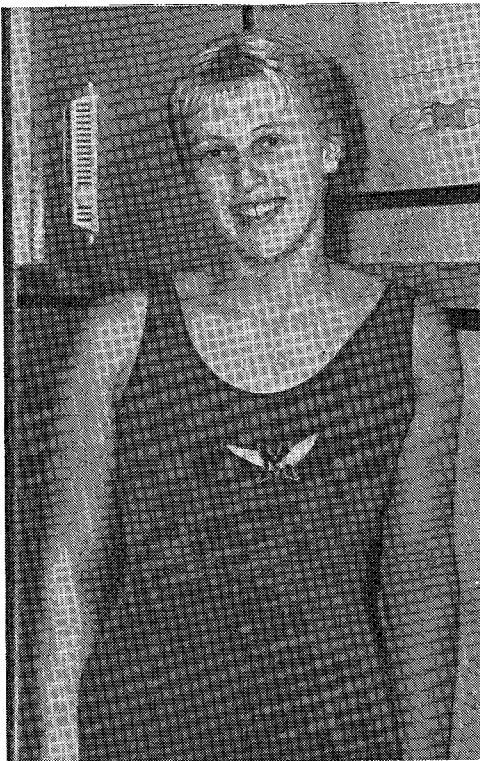
THE JUNIORS WHO SWIM LIKE SENIORS



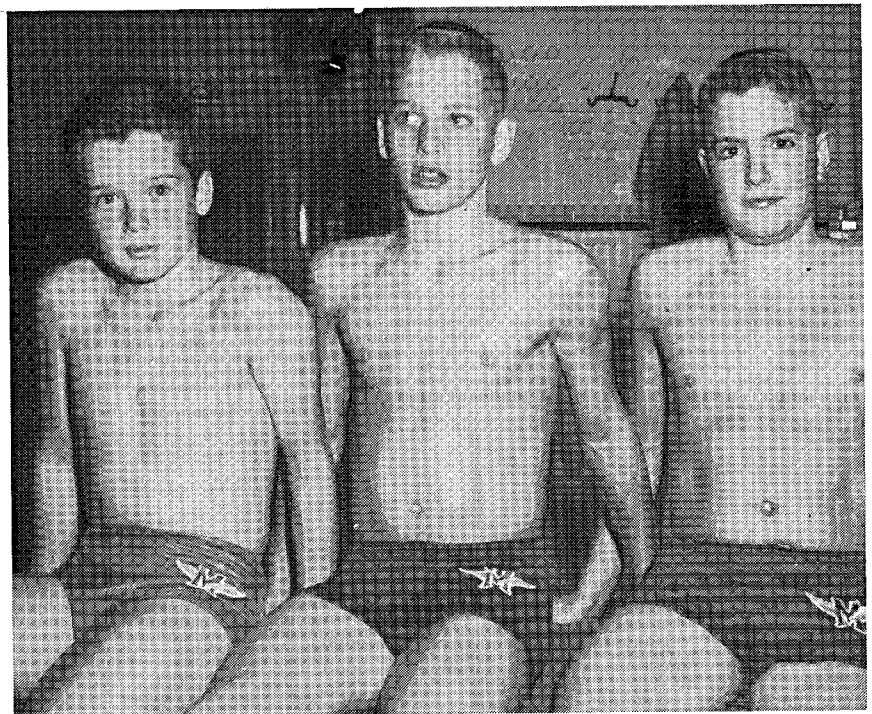
CAROLYN WOOD, 13, placed 5th in the 110 yard butterfly at the Pan Am trials. At 12, she captured 13 first places in the nation in her age-group. Carolyn is outstanding in all strokes.



NOEL GABIE, 13, placed 4th in the 110 yard backstroke at the 1959 Women's Nationals in Redding, California and 7th in the 110 yard backstroke at the Pan Am trials. In the 1959 National age group rankings, she received two ratings in the backstroke and two in the freestyle in the five best times.



PAM MAC PIKE, 13 years, is one of the outstanding breaststrokes in her age group in the nation. While she was still 12, she did a 1:16.5 for 100 yards, breaking the existing national record. In 1959 Pam set a national record in 11-12 50 yard breaststroke :35.4 (SC). She turned age group and then proceeded to set the record in the 100 meter breaststroke for 13-14 in 1:27.5 (LC).

These 13 year old lads are among the best in the nation. Hallinan excels in freestyle and butterfly and placed 3rd in the 1959 National Age Group 11-12 with a 1:11.0 in 100 meters (SC). Schollander is a freestyle and backstroke ace. He placed 1st in the 1959 National Age Group 11-12 50 meter backstroke (SC) :35.8 and 100 yard backstroke (SC) 1:09.5. He placed in the first five National times in six other individual events. Webb is outstanding in the butterfly having done the 100 yards in 1:04 and the 220 yards in 2:41.6.

KNICKERBOCKER'S MEDLEY SMASHER

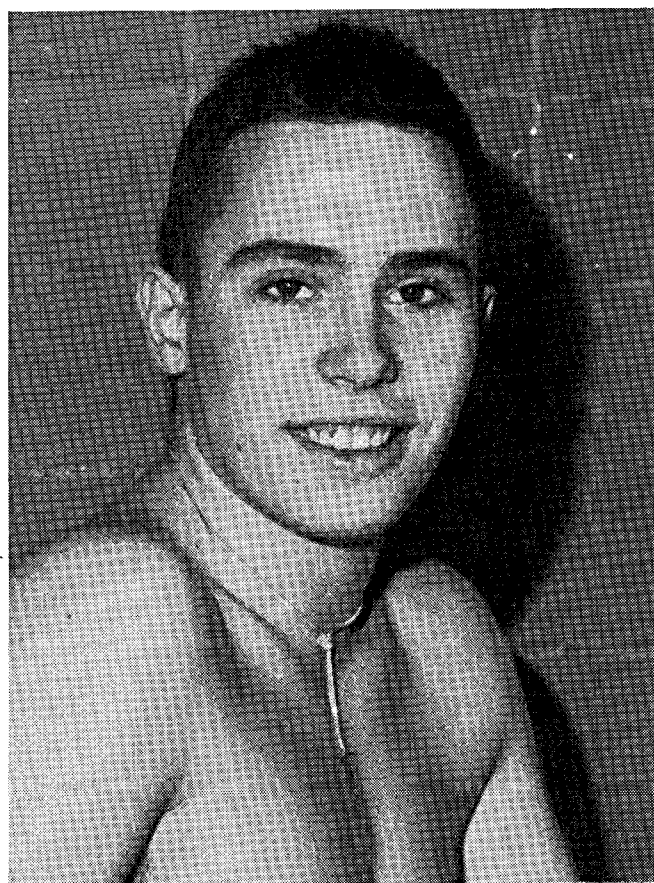
In today's trend toward stroke specialization, the spotlight does not fall very often on the performances of medley swimmers. Because of the new trend, or due to the fact that the individual medley is omitted from the Olympic games, most swimmers as they approach the longer distances go for the one or two favorite strokes.

Joe Stetz is swimming the longer distance individual medleys, liking them and smashing the records besides.

This 16-year All-American High School Prep Swimmer is the 1959 National Age Group Champion in the 400 meter individual medley with a new record of 5:43.0 (long course). For short course 400 yard Ind. Medley he is ranked 2nd in the 1959 five best times with a 5:04.0. Joe has also done well in the butterfly, receiving national recognition in 1958 and 59. In April, 1958 he won the 400 yard individual medley Junior National Championship. That same year he was also a member of the 800 yard Junior National Freestyle relay championship and the 4 mile long distance Junior National Championship Team.

He is a product of the Metropolitan Assoc. age group development program. Stetz attends Horace Mann Prep School, Bronx, N. Y., and represents the Knickerbocker Swim Club. Bob Alexander, Wayne, N. J., has coached this medley smasher for six years, working him out about 2 hrs. per day.

His next goal is college and a shot at the 1964 Olympics.



FLORIDA SAYS "BIGGEST MEET EVER"?

Hialeah, Fla. — Though it's been four months since the Fourth Annual International Invitational Swim Regatta was held in Miami (Aug. 25-29), Age Group swimmers and officials of the Metro Miami Swimming Assn. still haven't been able to catch their breaths. And, well they can't, for "the five-day meet was the largest ever held on the east coast," says Bill Burrell, swim coach of the Coral Gables Swimming Assoc.

Two pools were used; a 50-meter long course and 25 yard short course. The Regatta was alternated with the long course used one day and the short course the next. 92 long course events and 92 short course events were held. This was further broken down into the following Age-Group classifications:

15-16 Age—12 long and 14 short course. 13-14 age—10 long and 10 short course. 11-12 age—11 long and 9 short course. 9-10 age—7 long and 7 short course. 8 and under age—6 long and 6 short course.

The events included relays and a swimmer could enter all events in their class, including the relays. The meet attracted swimmers from as far north as New York; west as far as Little Rock, and Nashville. International flavor was added by a strong team from Cuba. Age Group Champions are:

8 & under Girls—Jan Krauser, Coral Ridge YC. Boys—Smiley Johns, Coral Ridge YC. 9-10 Girls—Pam Wheelright, St. Petersburg R.D. Boys—Alberto Raurrell, Cuba. 11-12 Girls—Pat Fleming, Pompano Beach S.A. SPA DROPS FINALS IN '60 AGE GROUP MEETS

Los Angeles — Age Group Swimmers competing in the SPAAAU Age Group Swimming meets will have to do their best in heats, it was revealed this month by John Fellows, Swim Comm. Chairman. Due to the tremendous increase of competitors in 1959, the SPA has completely revamped their meet program for the coming season.

It took a lot of persuasion of the parents by the coaching committee that, by elimination of the afternoon finals, a faster, better controlled meet could be developed. The meets will be patterned after the successful senior meets held this past year.

The new set-up follows this formula:

1. All entries must carry the swimmer's best time for each event entered at the distance specified. Entries must be signed by coach.

2. A card file on all Assoc. swimmers will be kept by Swim Comm. Sect. If entries show a higher time than on Comm. card file then entries' time will be changed.

3. Heats will be scheduled according to times with slowest times in early heats and the final heat to race swimmers with the fastest times.

4. Awards will be given to 1st, 2nd & 3rd place winners on a time basis with heat winners also receiving an award. A swimmer can receive but one award in any one event.

5. There will be a complete elimination of classified meets, also elimination of time standards for eligibility in Age Group Meets.

6. For two day meets, classes 8 and under, 9-10, 11-12 will swim in the mornings, 13-14, 15-16 in the afternoons. 5-6 group will be eliminated.

Jr. Olympics and Special Meets will revert back to the regular program of heats and finals.

To the swimmers, this means two half days of competition with no long delays between events... no hurried lunches and most important, the attainment of a competitive edge without let-down.

Slower swimmers will be stimulated to faster times by promotion to faster heats as their competitive times are lowered.

In 1959, SPA held 11 sanctioned open age group meets and 7 classified meets.

One has only to look at the figure to realize there are just not enough hours in a day to schedule a proper meet. Open age group meets averaged between 256 swimmers with 714 entries to 683 individual swimmers making 1,698 entries. 1,698 entries in a 6-lane pool make about 283 heats.

Classified Age Group meets tallied between 265 to 501 swimmers per meet with 594 to 1,075 individual entries.

CENTRAL AAU TO HOLD SWIM CLINIC

Oak Park, Ill.—A swim clinic will be held on January 16 at Portage Park, Chicago covering new rule changes made by the AAU convention and officiating. Ernest T. Sigler, Chairman of the Swimming Officials Comm. of the CAAU, is planning a long range program to build up a highly skilled and experienced group of people that will be competent to officiate at meets of national or international calibre. Said Sigler, "This is not to be construed as criticism of the officiating at the Pan Am Games, 90% done by CAAU people, with no complaints." Suggestions and opinions are requested—mail to E. T. AGE GROUPS CLASS SCORE AT PAN AM

Chicago, Ill. — The United States Women's Team that won the Pan American Games in Chicago, Aug. 27-Sept. 7, was so outstanding in performance that it will be most difficult for future teams to match it. Seven of the 16 girls who made up the American team were still of Age Group class at the time of the games.

All three U.S. swimmers in each individual event broke the Pan Am record... they broke 3 world records and every Pan Am record in 8 events. Only one silver medal was lost by the girls and they won both relays.

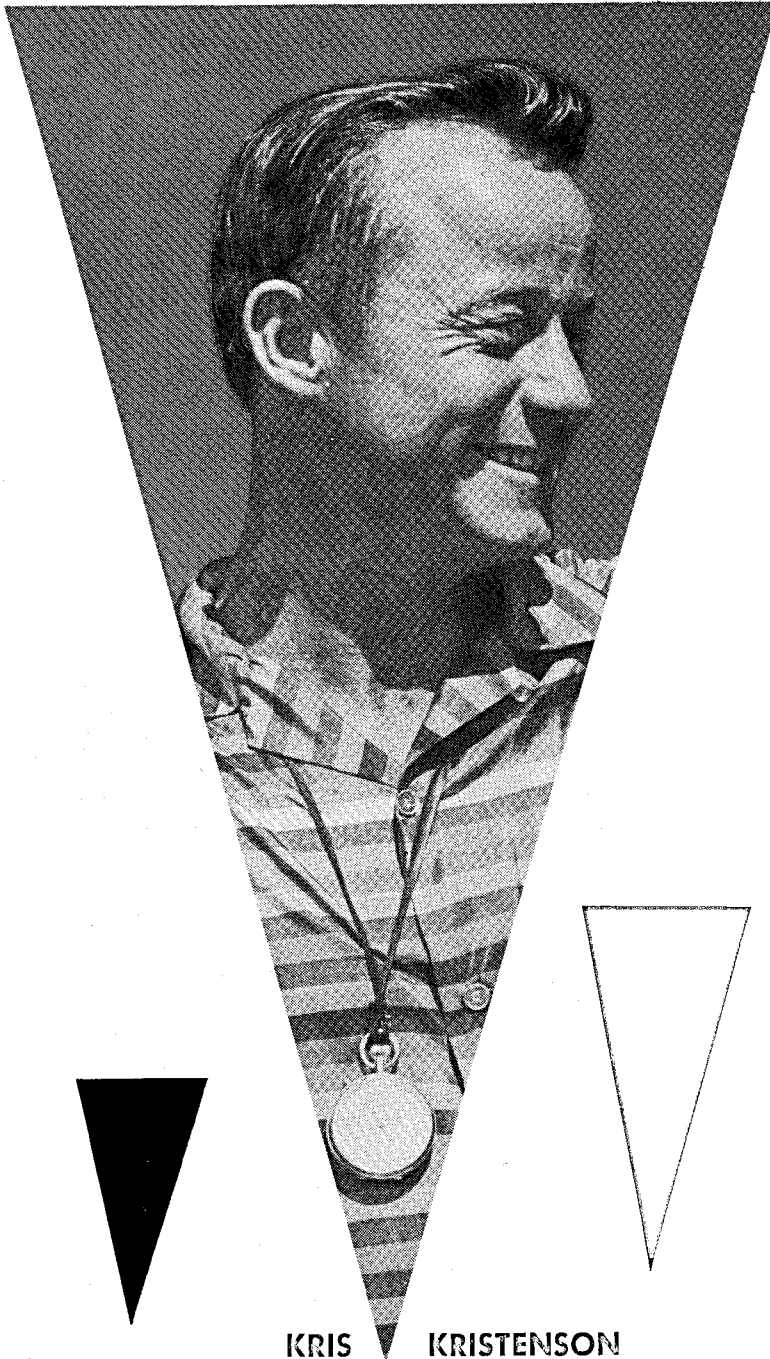
On the U. S. Men's Team, Santa Clara Swim Club's Steve Clark, 16, made the team as an alternate on the freestyle relay.

HE MAKES THEM SWIMMERS



KRIS KRISTENSON

Meet Kris Kristenson, JUNIOR SWIMMER'S COACH OF THE MONTH. The selection of Kris was not a difficult choice...for as United States Women's Pan American Coach, he justified his selection by the AAU by guiding the U. S. team to an outstanding effort. His training and handling of the team with 7 of the 16 members in Age Group class, was such that all improved on their performances done in trials and in most cases did their best time ever.

His preselected squad of "youngster-veterans" was molded by Kristenson into a harmonious effort that resulted in a U. S. team performance that will be seldom equaled. The "girls" were unanimous in their outspoken praise of Kristenson as a coach and advisor.

But the success and respect that Kris Kristenson won, has not come without prodigious effort and years of work in the sport.

Kris was born 44 years ago in Edmonton, Alberta, Canada. His family moved, when he was six, to Southern California. From the Los Angeles Public School systems, he went to Los Angeles Jr. College. While at J. C. he was a member of both the swim and water polo teams.

From Jr. College he attended Occidental College. Before graduating in 1940 with majors in Physical Education and Biology, he was back in the swim as a member of the swim and water polo teams.

Kris placed first in 50 Free and 2nd in 150 Back and third in Diving in the Conference meet. He was high point man on the Occidental Polo team which won the Conference championships for 3 years.

Came the war and Kris served in the Navy in Gene Tunney's Athletic Program. After discharge in 1945 as a Lieutenant, he taught in the Los Angeles Public School system.

Kris Kristenson still couldn't keep away from his love of the water. Winning deep water ocean swims and serving as Pool Director for the L. A. Recreation Dept. in summer and off hours only whetted his enthusiasm for the sport.

KRISTENSON OPENS SWIM SCHOOL

In 1950 the Kris Kristenson Swim School was opened at Sherman Oaks. The facilities were limited. Age Group was almost unheard of in Southern California. The only meets for Junior Swimmers was the Annual Los Angeles Examiner Meet and inter-club meets, with Capt. Paul Nass of Brentwood Swim School.

On his first Age Group team was Judy and Nancy Lockridge, Steve Prockter, Bobby and Patti Bennett, Sheila, Claudia and Darlene Anderson, Carolyn and Brian Murray, Anne Muesdorffer, Gail Human, Carolyn and Chris Christie. All 8 years or younger.

R...COACH OF THE MONTH

This group was joined by John Jurgenson who rode his bike 3½ miles 3 nights a week for teaching after swim school hours, and Susan Richter. Lessons consisted of 3 workouts a week with 1 hour for swimming and ½ hour for diving. Divers Donna Russell and Louita Nicholas received their first formal training at Kristenson's in 1951. In 3 years Kris had outgrown his pool and a new outdoor 25 yard pool was built on Victory Blvd. in No. Hollywood. Joining his team in his new school were Rodney and Brian Cargill, Mimi and Patti Kempner — and a short time later Marianne Hargreaves, the latter two destined to be among America's greatest breaststrokers.

COMPETITIVE SWIMMING

Though National Age Group records had been started and records were being recorded in Calif., only the Pacific Assoc. had made any sizeable progress in Age Group Swimming. SPA district was not active and the impetus for Age Group Swimmers was being supplied by the Southern Calif. Youth Swimming Assoc. with active help by Kris, Alex Kempner, Joseph McGuigan and many others.

Kris, with one of the few 25 yard pools, sponsored with the Valley Times, the first short course Jr. Olympics in 1953 and 1954. Now the Kris Kristenson School was really in the swim. To the team, in 1953, was added Mike Shephard, John Rackin and Richard Karrell.

And so it went. Age Group Swimming became stronger and more popular in Southern California. The SPA Swim Committee had now become a potent governing body in Southern Calif. with larger meet schedules, new rules and cohesive long range planning.

Today, Coach Kristenson works his team 3 times a week, 1½ hours per work-out. In summer they have 5 days a week and all are given long course training at the local Park and Recreation Dept. 50 meter pool. Swimmers going to Nationals work out daily, 5 or 6 times a week. He uses the "interval" method of training... subscribes to the use of vitamins or wheat germ... advises body building exercises to permit the body to keep up strength with growth.

On the subject of races in greater distances for younger swimmers, Kris said, "I'm in favor of it. It gives them a chance to think about their stroke... gives a better chance to swimmers who have not the physical development... is a greater stroke developer... and is the best conditioner. As a matter of fact, for the average Age Grouper, 7 or 8 is early enough to start competition unless he or she has developed early... of course there are always exceptions."

Presently on his swim team are *Marianne Hargreaves, 19, *Patti Kempner, 17, *Judy Lockridge, 16, *Bobby Bennett, 16, Jean Hansen, 16, Rosalind Rogers, 15, Rich McGeagh, 15, Mike Shephard, 14, Nancy Lockridge, 14, Babbie Anderson, 13, Patti Bennett, 13, Howard Boren, 13, Jeffrey Calvert, 13, Rodney Cargill, 12, Brian Cargill, 8.

*Training for 1960 Olympics.

Also on training programs are 20 swimmers 7 to 13 years of age.

FINDING TALENT

Asked for the secret of finding his swimmers, Kris replied—"The kids come to school to learn... some just have a feel for the water, it comes to them naturally. Some learn well and have not as much natural ability, but hard work makes up for the lack. Still the odds are against them." Kris continues, "We get back yard pool swimmers whose parents think they are whizzes. We give them a performance trial and if they show anything, they are placed in Intermediate — Advanced class for stroke refinement." Kris added, "Age Group Swimming is a family affair. It involves self sacrifice by the entire family... from Mother driving the swimmer to school, waiting around during the lesson, to the whole family changing their week-end plans to take in the meets."

Kris strongly believes in specialization. Saying, "it seems to be indicated for prime success if a swimmer is going to go all the way up. At Pan Am., only 2 girls swam in more than one stroke and they finished third."

When asked about the U. S. chances in the 1960 Olympic games he replied, "Our chances look brighter than one year ago. Results from Pan Am. give greater hope to be more dominate in the swimming events. The last Olympiad we dominated only the Men's and Women's Butterfly and were second best in both Men and Women events. With the return of Holland to the '60 games, the women's division will be between that country, Australia and the United States. In the men's division it will be between Australia, U. S. and Japan."

Kris Kristenson has taught well. He has championed the cause of Age Group and Senior Swimming in Southern California for 10 years, and has done much to increase the high standards of competition, good sportsmanship and fair play. His coaching ability, has earned him the respect of coaches the country over. JUNIOR SWIMMER is proud in honoring Kris Kristenson as their coach of the month.

Molly Botkin, age 16, Sherman Oaks, Calif., was JUNIOR SWIMMER'S cover girl in the Spring 1955 issue (No. 12). Born on Aug. 26, 1943, Molly passes officially out of age-group in 1960. With the 1960 Olympic swimming events starting on Aug. 26th, no finer birthday present could this champion want, than to be at Rome swimming for the United States.

Developed in the age group program she has set national records from the age of ten in freestyle, backstroke and butterfly. Many of her oldest age-group records set as a 11-12 have held against the onslaught of the new whiz-kids.

These are her records challenging swimmers in the 1960 season: 11-12 Yrs. Short Course: 50 Yd. Free—:27.3; 50 Mt. Free—:30.5; 100 Yd. Free—1:01.6; 50 Yd. Fly—:30.0. 13-14 Yrs. Short Course: 50 Yd. Free—:26.7; 100 Yd. Fly—1:05.0. Long Course: 110 Yd. Free—1:07.2; 100 Mt. Free—1:04.4; 110 Yd. Fly—1:17.3. 15-16 Yrs. Short Course: 200 Yd. Free—2:09.5.

Today Molly is training for the 1960 Games. With the Pan Am behind her (see page 6), this young champ realizes much work must be done to achieve that most "Happy Birthday."

5 ASSOCIATIONS BID FOR MEN'S OUTDOOR NATIONALS

Plans for sending a top-ranking swimming team to the Olympic Games in Rome are well under way. At the convention in Miami, December 4th, the Olympic Committee and the A.A.U. will award the Tryouts and the Outdoor National Championships. It is hoped we will be able to set up these events so that competitors will have a chance to cover both without too much time and expense. It is hoped that prospective bidders for both the Championships and the Trials will be in the Middle West. At the present time there are five organizations interested in the Outdoor National Championships for men. As far as the Trials are concerned, it is assumed that prospective sponsors will present their bids at the same time in Miami.

The dates for the Outdoor Nationals would almost have to be the last weekend in July with the Olympic Trials following the next week. This would enable the Committees to place their entry blanks to the Executive Board of the Olympic Committee for approval by the 10th of August, which is the deadline.

The Men's Swimming Committee will select first and second in the individual events for the Olympic team and the first six men in the 200-meter freestyle, which will make up the relay, and two alternates. The medley relay team has to be chosen from the entire team members.

The Opening Ceremony of the Olympic Games in Rome is the 25th of August. The swimming events will be the first week of the Games instead of the last week as has been done in the past.

The American swimming team appears to be strong enough to give any team in the world a good race for a championship. The improvement over the Olympic team we had in Australia is very encouraging.

SPA OK'S WINTER LEAGUE

Los Angeles — The Southern Pacific Association gave its blessings this month to the formation of three leagues for inter-club Age-Group Swim Meets, it was announced by John Fellows, Chairman of the Swim Committee. The idea of coaches John Joseph, Santa Monica S.S., Niels Madsen, West Valley S.S., Jim Marcus, Huntington S.C., Rick Roland, Sammy Lee S.S. and Don Sonia, Burbank S.A., is to fill the need of longer events for Age Groupers, so that when they move up in age or go into Senior Events, they are not lost.

In approving the program, Fellows said, "The leagues have a lot of merit. It provides informal competitive swimming to hundreds of swimmers in the winter months when their interest tends to lag. Best of all, it uses the entire club squad, not just the top performers."

Three leagues were formed. The Big Six swims through December. Members are Hawaiian Village S.C., Sunny Hills S.C., Sea Horse S.S., Los Coyotes C.C., Bud Lynden S.S.

Orange Coast League will operate in the southwest area.

The largest, Metropolitan League, has eight teams in its loop. Instead of holding the usual age group events, this group is trying to prepare swimmers for their future in senior competition by holding events in longer distance. These teams make up the Metro league: Burbank Swim Academy, Sammy Lee S.S., Los Angeles A.C., Bud Lynden S.S., Lynwood S.C., Santa Monica S.C., South Bay S.C., and West Valley S.S.

Age brackets are boys and girls 8 and under and 9-10 years with races in 50 yards in all strokes plus 100 yards freestyle for the latter group. 11-12 years swim 100 yards in all strokes plus 200 yards freestyle. 13-14 years swim 200 yards in all strokes. Swimmers may move up to any group and then drop down to original group. They cannot compete in more than three events including relays.

The duel meets will be held Friday afternoons every two weeks starting January 15, with five events in each Age Group, free

and medley relays in 10 and under and 14 and under, to total 48 events.

To be eligible to join the Metro-loop, clubs must have a minimum of 30 swimmers. Unattached swimmers currently training on their squads and intending to attach when eligible can compete. Completed club entries must be submitted to the clerk of course 30 minutes prior to the start.

General A.A.U. rules will prevail and times set in 25 yd. short course will be recorded for league records. A perpetual trophy for duel meet winners will be awarded with retirement by club winning three consecutive years.

All teams will compete at the end of the season in a championship meet with winner receiving Conference Trophy.

Early pre-season favorites are Santa Monica S.C., West Valley S.S., and Burbank S.A. Sammy Lee and LAAC have good chance to upset.

WHAT'S WRONG WITH BUFFALO?

Buffalo, N. Y. — Flo Klahn, swim coach of the Delaware YMCA girls' swim team and Chairman of Women's Swimming in the Niagara District AAU, reports almost complete public apathy toward age group swimming in the Buffalo area. She further states that, "we have a number of beautiful swimming pools in and around Buffalo schools and clubs, but not one will open them for the purpose of swimming meets, or rent an hour a few days a week to a team for practice."

Several years ago, beginning with four girls, Coach Klahn started a girl's age group team. The team, Delaware YMCA of Buffalo, now numbers 55 girls. Training is accomplished in the Delaware Y's 20 yd. x 20 ft. pool. Spectator space is limited to 40. This is the only place available to train and hold meets.

Also using these limited facilities is a boys' age group team of 36 and the full 800 member Y. Coach Klahn has the staggering sum of FOUR and ONE-HALF (4½) hrs. per week for pool use.

To support her group she organized a Parent Council, who through socials, raise funds to help

the team. During the winter she holds four or five age group meets with only ribbon awards. (Winter in Buffalo is a long season, 8-10 months.)

Through her enthusiasm and effort, the following girl's age-group teams in the Niagara District are operating: Jamestown YMCA, Henry VanZanten, Phy. Dir.; Rochester Natatorium, Fred Hushla, Coach; Rochester Arnett YMCA, Gordon Donahue, Phy. Dir.; Auburn YMCA, Barbara Huebner, Phy. Dir.; Ithaca YMCA, Miles Tipton, Phy. Dir.

It is obvious that if Coach Klahn and her age group program is to succeed, much less grow, Buffalo will have to look forward. Other communities in the U. S., far smaller in size and means, have done far more for their youth. Perhaps Buffalo doesn't realize that profit is a well organized youth program and not gate receipts. JUNIOR SWIMMER will support any program that helps the youth of our country.

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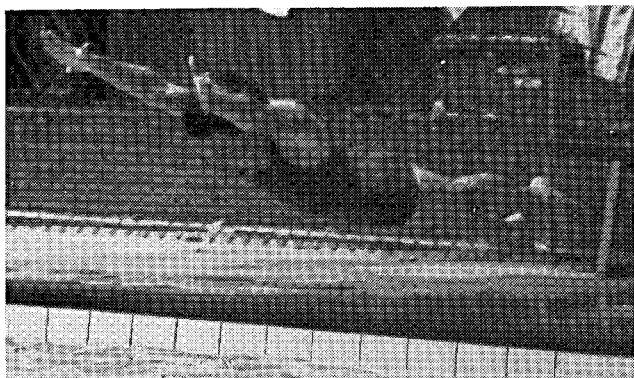

Olympic Champion (especially true in smaller age group districts), with slight chance for national placement. The dissenters say, "Would not a relaxation of limiting rules, even to permitting a swimmer to enter four (4) events stimulate better competition."

RELAY COMPETITION

Relays... oh what a heartbreaker when an entire team of four cannot compete because one member of the team failed to show due to illness or other reason. And an alternate, if all do show, loses the opportunity to compete in one or two events, as the case may be. Younger competitors may not move up in Age-Group. There ought to be a solution to this.

Certificates of participation... they too add up to trouble. "Something for everyone." Should it be a "souvenir" or a certificate to be earned? Earned by performance requirement perhaps, but in some manner to give it meaning... or CLASS.

Certificates could be given to 4th, 5th & 6th place winners at district meets, or to heat winners. Any award should be an award for merit. At one of the Jr. Olympic meets I attended last year, more certificates were swept up by pool attendants after the meet, than were taken home by the contestants.

TRIALS AND FINALS

Another rather obnoxious rule to the antagonists of the Jr. Olympic rules, is the allowance of districts to hold trials and finals as much as three months apart. On this, hinges a big gripe, for even though a swimmer has qualified in a preliminary meet at one age level, he may compete in the finals at the same age level even though an age change occurs. This is in direct conflict with AAU, which rules contestant's age on date of meet determines the age group he may enter. In some districts unregistered athletes are permitted to compete.

The surge of bitterness that breaks into the open on many occasions is best summed up by a leading coach. "The Jr. Olympic program is run by track and field men. There isn't a swim man on the committee. They don't know our problems... let the people who know swimming, run swimming."

JR. OLYMPIC RECORDS

Let's look at the RECORD... by record, we mean the National Junior Olympic Records. If they meet all AAU requirements, why not submit to the National Age Group Swim Committee for consideration in their annual five best times. Or are they "second class" marks? Enter the National Jr. Olympic times with Age-Group, and if they are in the five best times, an asterisk next to time would indicate it is the best National Junior Olympic time. In some districts, Jr. Olympics are the only programs that give competitors the opportunity to swim relays.

It is now necessary to check both Nat. Age Group and Jr. Olympic records for the best performances.

Summing up, one must almost conclude that the National Age Group program has kept abreast and/or developed its program to fit the tremendous growth of age group swimming, while the more publicized Jr. Olympic program is static and losing "class" it so richly deserves.

EDITOR'S NOTE: This feature in no way reflects the writer's viewpoint or opinions. It is our way of exposing to the open discussions and criticisms heard during the last few years at different district meets by those active or connected with age group swimming. It is our sincere hope that Junior Swimmer will serve as a sounding board for constructive criticisms or praise. The editor is wholeheartedly behind the National AAU Jr. Olympics Committee for the work it has done and is continuing to do. It is a most intelligent approach to mass participation in swimming, a sport which is rapidly becoming a major sport and one that certainly fits into this nation's "Youth Fitness Program."

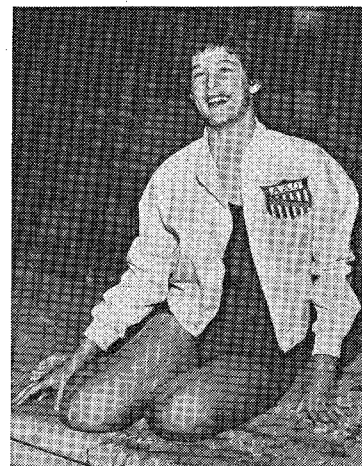
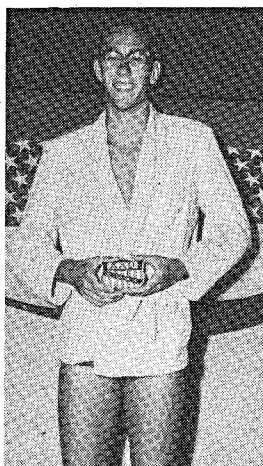
