

ENGLISH CHANNEL HISTORY THE WORLD'S TWO GREATEST CHALLENGES BY BRUCE WIGO PRESIDENT/CEO, INTERNATIONAL SWIMMING HALL OF FAME

While mankind has succeeded in conquering many adventure challenges, swimming the English Channel and climbing Mount Everest stand out above the rest. But long before Mt. Everest was identified, it was the Channel that was used as a common metaphor for being the most difficult challenge for man versus nature.

Even though the first attempt to climb the summit of Mt. Everest occurred nearly 50 years after the first Channel attempt, more than twice as many people have climbed the mountain than have swum the Channel. This disparity has grown in recent years due to the radical improvement in climbing technology. However, the mountain remains more dangerous than the Channel, as far more people have died trying to reach the summit than the number of swimmers trying to reach land.
